

ESTABLISHMENT OF 7 NEW GRADUATE COURSES IN MUSIC

A. Proposal Summary and Catalog Copy

 a. <u>SUMMARY</u>. The Department of Music proposes to initiate 7 new graduate courses for its proposed Graduate Certificate in Vocal Performance: MUSC 5153, MUSC 6453, MUPF 6253, MUPF 6253L, MUPF 6120, MUPF 6120L, and MUSC 6600.

b. PROPOSED CATALOGUE COPY.

MUSC 5153. Advanced Vocal Pedagogy. (3) Prerequisite: MUSC 5137. Advanced research in singing. Topics include advanced anatomy and physiology, singer health, complementary modalities, and practical studio application. (*Spring*)

MUSC 6453. Voice Teaching Internship. (1) Prerequisite: Admission to the Graduate Certificate in Vocal Pedagogy program. Applied teaching with a select number of students, both male and female, and a weekly seminar to review and discuss issues and solutions in the studio. The student will develop and document a systematic teaching methodology, learn how to select appropriate repertoire based on singer ability, and apply appropriate protocols for technical issues. May be repeated for credit (*Fall, Spring*)

MUPF 6253. Applied Music: Voice. (2) Prerequisite: Admission to the Graduate Certificate in Vocal Pedagogy program. Co-requisites: MUPF 6253L and approved principle ensemble. This course consists of private instruction, a one-hour lesson per week leading to a formal jury at the end of the semester. May be repeated for credit. (Fall, Spring)

MUPF 6253L. Voice Masterclass. (0) Co-requisite: MUPF 6253. Weekly masterclasses for MUPF 6253. May be repeated. (Fall, Spring)

MUPF 6120. Graduate Choral Ensemble. (1) Prerequisite: Audition. Co-requisite: MUPF 6120L. A mixed chorus that performs music of many styles from the Baroque period to the present. 3 contact hours. May be repeated for credit. (Fall, Spring)

MUPF 6120L. Graduate Choral Ensemble Sectional Rehearsals. (0) Co-requisite: MUPF 6120. Sectional rehearsals for MUPF 6120. May be repeated. (Fall, Spring)

MUSC 6600. Concluding Seminar (3) Prerequisite: Admission to the Graduate Certificate in Vocal Pedagogy program. Concluding Seminar consists of a Directed Learning Project, enabling the student to focus on his or her area of pedagogical interest. Students are mentored through the project by a supervising instructor. Concluding Seminar is intended to provide a learning experience for students to gain additional knowledge that will reinforce their Vocal Pedagogy program and support the student's career goals.

B. Justification

- a. NEED. The proposed Graduate Certificate in Vocal Pedagogy (see the attached Proposal for a New Certificate Program) is designed to provide the advanced student with a concentrated program focusing on the methodology and practice of teaching voice beyond the undergraduate level. MUPF 6120 and 6120L will offer singing experience in a group setting, while MUPF 6253 and 6253L will provide applied training in solo voice. MUSC 6453 offers learning by doing with the hands-on experience of applied teaching, while MUSC 5137, 5153, and 6600 complement the curriculum with topics in anatomy, physiology, methodology, and application.
- b. PREREQUISITES AND COREQUISTES. With the exception of MUPF 6120 and 6120L, all of the courses will require admission to the Graduate Certificate in Vocal Pedagogy as a prerequisite (see the attached Proposal for a New Certificate Program for admission requirements). It is possible that there will be an occasional student in another graduate program who is talented enough to successfully audition into MUPF 6120 (in fact, there is currently a post-baccalaureate student in the psychology department taking the subject as a graduate-level topics course). For this reason, MUPF 6120 and MUPF 6120L will require a rigorous audition, but not admission to the Graduate Certificate in Vocal Pedagogy program, as a prerequisite. Additionally, some courses will have co-requisites within the Graduate Certificate in Vocal Pedagogy (see the course descriptions in the Proposed Catalogue Copy).
- c. <u>COURSE NUMBERING</u>. The course content is consistent with the levels of academic and artistic advancement of the graduate-level students for whom they are intended. MUSC 5137 has an undergraduate counterpart (MUSC 4137), as does MUSC 5153 (MUSC 4153); both will be cross-listed and taught concurrently. The courses at the 6000-level are designated for graduate students only.

Within the Department of Music, the final two digits "53" (in MUPF 6253, MUPF 6253L, MUSC 6453, and MUSC 5153 indicate coursework specifically designed for the voice students (similar codes have been assigned to all the other instruments as well).

d. IMPROVEMENT OF SCOPE, QUALITY, OR EFFICIENCY OF PROGRAMS OR INSTRUCTION. The courses outlined in this proposal will be a complement to the post-baccalaureate education of the student through intensive studies in topics including anatomy, physiology, methodology, and application. This additional education will enhance teaching proficiency and ensure better success in the professional field.

C. Impact

- a. <u>STUDENTS SERVED</u>. These courses are specifically designed for students enrolled in the proposed Graduate Certificate in Vocal Pedagogy.
- b. EFFECT ON EXISTING COURSES AND CURRICULA.
 - MUPF 6120, MUPF 6120L, MUPF 6253, MUPF 6253L, and MUSC 6453 will be offered every Fall and Spring; MUSC 5137 will be offered once a year, in the Fall semesters; and MUSC 5153 and MUSC 6600 will be offered once a year, in the Spring semesters.
 - ii. The content and frequency of the courses will not affect the content of any other music courses offered. If anything, the courses will strengthen the instruction for the undergraduate students who will be enrolled in cross-listed courses at the undergraduate level. In order to keep the certificate highly competitive and ensure a positive impact on the undergraduate students, the yearly enrollment in the program will cap at ten students.

MUPF 6120 and MUPF 6120L are the graduate level equivalents of MUPF 1120 and MUPF 1120L. MUPF 6253 and MUPF 6253L are the graduate-level equivalents of MUPF 1253, MUPF 1253L, MUPF 3253, and MUPF 3253L. These courses will be taught separately from their undergraduate counterparts.

MUSC 5137 will be cross-listed and taught concurrently with MUSC 4137, an existing undergraduate course. The main differences between MUSC 4137 and MUSC 5137 will be that the graduate level course will be twice as intensive, with significantly more reading and writing assignments. MUSC 5153 will be cross-listed and taught concurrently with MUSC 4153, an advanced pedagogy class that undergraduates may take as an elective. This class is not currently offered and is being developed as a new course proposal. The main differences between MUSC 4153 and MUSC 5153 is that the graduate-level course will be twice as intensive, with significantly more reading and writing assignments.

These courses are specifically designed for students enrolled in the proposed Graduate Certificate in Vocal Pedagogy, with the only possible exception being a rare student in another graduate program who is talented enough to

successfully audition into and participate in MUPF 6120 and MUPF 6120L.

- iii. The anticipated enrollments for these courses are between six and ten students annually. Larger enrollments would risk diluting the intensity that will make this program so effective.
- iv. Due to the uniqueness of their subject matters, enrollments in these courses will not compete with enrollment in any other courses.
- v. The Graduate Certificate in Vocal Pedagogy will not consume any resources that would have otherwise been committed to any other courses and curricula.
- vi. No other areas of catalog copy will be affected.

D. Resources Required To Support Proposal

a. PERSONNEL.

- i. The courses will be taught by existing faculty. No new faculty will be required.
- ii. MUSC 5137, MUSC 5153, MUSC 6453, and MUSC 6600 will all be taught by Dr. Alissa Deeter, who is an Associate Professor of Applied Voice and Vocal Pedagogy. MUPF 6253 and MUPF 6253L are available to Dr. Alissa Deeter, Dr. Brian Arreola, and Dr. Jeffery Price, all of whom already teach MUPF 1253, MUPF 1253L, MUPF 3253, and MUPF 3253L. MUPF 6120 and MUPF 6120L will be taught by Dr. Randy Haldeman.
- b. <u>PHYSICAL FACILITY</u>. The facilities in Robinson Hall for the Performing Arts are adequate for these courses. No new facilities are required.
- c. <u>EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES</u>. The existing equipment and supplies in Robinson Hall are adequate for these courses. No new equipment or supplies are required.
- d. <u>COMPUTER</u>. The existing computing equipment in Robinson Hall is adequate for these courses. No new computer support is required.
- e. <u>AUDIO-VISUAL</u>. The existing audio-visual equipment in Robinson Hall is adequate for these courses. No new audio-visual equipment is required.
- f. OTHER RESOURCES. No new resources are required.
- g. No new sources of funding are required.

COURSE NUMBER AND TITLE

MUSC 5153: Advanced Vocal Pedagogy

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Advanced research in singing. Topics include advanced anatomy and physiology, singer health, complementary modalities, and practical studio application. (Spring)

PREREQUISITES

MUSC 5137

OBJECTIVES

- ✓ To study human anatomy by exploring how the systems of the body relate back to voice production
- ✓ To examine the voice in health and disease
- ✓ To explore complementary modalities and their effects on vocal production
- ✓ To learn to apply the class information in a practical way in the voice studio

INSTRUCTIONAL METHOD

MUSC 5153 uses a variety of instructional techniques. This class requires intensive lectures, class preparation, reading, and in-depth topical discussions. Students will give a presentation on a particular topic of interest. Class participation will include peer teaching in order to apply discussed protocols.

MEANS OF STUDENT EVALUATION

Final Exam	20%
Quizzes (10% each)	30%
Presentation	20%
Peer Teaching	10%
Class Participation	10%

Final Exam: The final exam is cumulative based on the experiences and topics of the semester.

Quizzes: There will be quizzes given throughout the semester on pertinent material covered in class.

<u>Presentation</u>: The presentation offers the student an opportunity to delve deeper into a particular topic. The ability to do a presentation well is a valuable skill that many students will find useful in connection with their applied teaching.

<u>Peer Teaching</u>: Teaching peers in the group setting offers immediate feedback and discussion on the experience. This is a valuable exercise in applying the information being addressed in the classroom.

<u>Class Participation</u>: Class participation is an important element in MUSC 5153 by offering a forum for students to hone skills through discussion and feedback.

May be repeated for credit. 1 credit. (Fall, Spring)

PREREQUISITES

MUSC 6453 is intended for post-baccalaureate students.

OBJECTIVES

- ✓ To understand the strengths and weaknesses of and differentiate between various learning and teaching styles
- ✓ To develop a personal teaching methodology and philosophy in the studio
- ✓ To assess, generate and administer grades
- ✓ To work with students in a one-on-one instructional basis

INSTRUCTIONAL METHOD

The instructional method will be supervised teaching practice and individual/group discussions.

MUSC 6600: Concluding Seminar

COURSE DESCRIPTION

The Concluding Seminar consists of a Directed Learning Project, enabling the student to focus on his or her area of pedagogical interest. Students are mentored through the project by a supervising instructor. Concluding Seminar is intended to provide a learning experience for students to gain additional knowledge that will reinforce their Vocal Pedagogy program and support their career goals. 3 credits. (Spring)

PREREQUISITES

Admission into the Graduate Certificate in Voice Pedagogy program.

OBJECTIVES

- ✓ To conduct research related to a professional knowledge area of interest using various resources
- ✓ To formulate a means of integrating the information into an instructional protocol
- ✓ To prepare a research report on the conclusions using the appropriate academic format
- ✓ To present findings in a logical and engaging manner to a group

INSTRUCTIONAL METHOD

MUSC 6600 is an independent study project with faculty supervision.

MEANS OF STUDENT EVALUATION

The Directed Learning Project culminates in a final paper and supporting presentation. The instructor will use the following steps in the Directed Learning Project process when assigning the grade:

Initial Presentation of Topic: At the beginning of the semester, the student will meet with the faculty supervisor to discuss the proposed topic.

Abstract: A paper of approximately five pages in length, the abstract presents the topic and discusses its importance, reviews pertinent related literature, and offers an explanation of how this topic fits into the student's teaching methodology. The abstract may also include a preliminary bibliography.

Rough Draft: Students will submit a rough draft to their faculty supervisor for feedback by an agreed deadline.

Final Paper: Students will submit the final paper by the deadline specified by the faculty supervisor.

Presentation: Students will present the findings of their research at a formal presentation where all students and faculty are invited.

Objectives:

•To demonstrate healthy vocal production and expressive singing.

- To study, rehearse and publicly perform quality choral literature to professional standards.
- To develop leadership and pedagogy skills required of a principal section leader (6120L).
- To identify and remediate common problems in vocal production, diction, style, and rehearsal behaviors commonly found in developing choral singers (6120L).

<u>Grades</u>: Grades will be determined by rehearsal preparation, attendance, and concert performance. Formal assessments of concert repertoire may be made at the director's discretion to determine your grade. You must participate in all scheduled public performances, tours, and retreats (and their dress rehearsals) to pass the course.

As is clearly stated in the UNC Charlotte Attendance Policy, "Students are expected to attend punctually *all* scheduled sessions in the courses for which they are registered." Obviously, the director may make exceptions as is necessary. Students must contact the director (or his/her designee) to establish an excused absence *a priori*. The director will make reasonable accommodations on a case by-case basis and at his/her sole discretion; these easements do not establish any precedence.

Specific explanations of the grading rationale and criterion are included in an attachment, and are considered an integral part of this document.

Rehearsals: Rehearsals take place Mondays and Wednesdays from 12:30 until 1:45 in Robinson Hall Choral Rehearsal Room (Robinson 145). You should be warmed up and ready to sing at 12:30. Additionally you must register for MUPF 6120L. The lab for this course (also called a sectional) meets only on Fridays from 12:30 – 1:45, and you must attend those sectionals as detailed in the accompanying course schedule. Additional required rehearsals are rarely scheduled, but if they are, you must attend them also. Efficient use of rehearsal time requires that each member of the ensemble prepare his or her part *a priori*. In addition to meeting the technical demands of the repertoire, each member of the ensemble should strive to improve the quality, flexibility, and control of his or her vocal instrument. These objectives require that you maintain a sufficient practice schedule outside rehearsal. *Rehearsing is not the same as practicing!* Concerts: Several concerts, a tour and/or a weekend retreat may be scheduled during the semester. You must perform in all concerts, dress rehearsals, and attend the tour/retreat (if scheduled) to receive course credit (excluding international tours). Other performances may be scheduled with advance notice, see the Course Calendar (included) and on Moodle for the latest and changing information.

Attire:

MEN: A formal black tuxedo (black jacket and black pants, black vest and bow tie, black socks, black dress shoes), plus deodorant, and lack of cologne or other strong scents. These are provided by the student but must be approved by the director. Simple finger rings (one per hand) are the only visible jewelry allowed.

WOMEN: A black concert dress purchased through the department, flesh-toned/tan/or sheer black hose, and closed-toe black shoes with low heels (preferably character shoes). Students will be required to attend an outside professional performance, and will be responsible for the ticket price (normally between \$10-\$20). In addition, students may be required to contribute to costs associated with travel, meals, or lodging while on tour or retreats. These costs will generally be less than \$50, and, in any case, announced well in advance.

The course instructor may modify the standards and requirements set forth in this syllabus at any time. COURSE NUMBER AND TITLE

MUPF 6253: Applied Music: Voice

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course consists of private instruction, a one hour lesson per week. Minimum of four hours of independent practice per day. May be repeated for credit. 2 credits (Fall, Spring)

PREREQUISITES

Admission into the Graduate Certificate in Voice Pedagogy program. Co-Requisites: MUPF 6253L, MUPF 6120 and MUPF 6120L.

OBJECTIVES

- ✓ To further develop and refine knowledge of vocal techniques
- ✓ To further develop and refine the understanding of body awareness and proprioception
- ✓ To further develop and refine both performance skills
- ✓ To increase knowledge of vocal repertoire, musical styles, and diction
- ✓ To prepare selected repertoire for performance

INSTRUCTIONAL METHOD

Students will receive individual instruction. Feedback will be provided at each lesson and video media will be made available for reference.

MEANS OF STUDENT EVALUATION

The jury grade acts as the final grade for Applied Voice, though it may be raised or lowered as the instructor deems appropriate based on the following course expectations.

Attendance: Students are expected to arrive on time and attend all lessons. Absences will be excused at the discretion of the instructor and only for absences discussed with the instructor at least 24 hours in advance. The student must be responsible for scheduling make-up lessons. Unexcused absences will not be made up and will result in an F for that lesson. Lessons that must be cancelled by the instructor will be made up.

Repertoire: Students are expected to prepare 8-10 memorized pieces representing at least four languages (Required: Italian, English, German, and French). Selections should encompass all periods of vocal repertoire including the contemporary idiom. Arias from the standard collection of opera and oratorio; song cycles from the German and French schools, contemporary song literature, chamber music, or literature of a comparable level.

Preparation: During every lesson, the instructor will assess the problems of the student and offer appropriate solutions. The amount and quality of practice time will directly affect lesson progress. Students are required to practice a minimum of five hours per week. Failure to do so could result in a lower grade. IPA is required for all repertoire in a foreign language. All applied voice students must supply a word-for-word translation of foreign language repertoire. The teacher will not address repertoire that has not been properly prepared. Students must have accompanist copies at every lesson.

Applied Master Class: Attendance and participation is required of all students taking applied voice. Students will be expected to perform their selections from memory and have a prepared translation for those pieces in a foreign language. Students will sign up for performance times at the beginning of the semester.

Accompanists: Students are responsible for hiring an accompanist. Accompanists are required for performance on Student Recitals, Applied Master Classes, and Voice Juries. Accompanists for lessons will be required after midterms. Music for performance must be supplied to the accompanist 2 weeks in advance. Music should be double-sided and three-hole punched, with no cut off notes.

Voice Juries: A jury is a type of final examination that occurs during finals week. In a jury, selections are performed from memory for the members of the voice faculty. The performer should also be prepared to discuss the translations of pieces in other languages and artistic interpretation of the repertoire. The inability to give an acceptable translation could result in the lowering of the student's jury grade.

Concert Attendance: Applied voice students are required to attend designated recitals and concerts during the semester. Voice majors should refer to the Student Handbook for attendance requirements

OBJECTIVES

- ✓ To work on applied lesson material in a performance setting

INSTRUCTIONAL METHOD

Voice Master Class provides an educational performance venue for each student enrolled in an applied voice unit, thereby participating in a fulfilling vocal experience. Students will receive instruction in a master class setting. Both the instructor and observing students will provide feedback at each class in a positive environment.

MEANS OF STUDENT EVALUATION

Attendance: Students are expected to arrive on time and attend all classes. Absences will be excused at the discretion of the instructor and <u>only</u> for absences discussed with the instructor **24 hours in advance**. COURSE NUMBER AND TITLE

MUSC 4153: Vocal Pedagogy & Materials

COURSE DESCRIPTION

An introduction to the basic methodologies used in establishing good vocal technique.

PREREQUISITES

MUSC 4137 is intended for Voice Majors.

OBJECTIVES

- ✓ To provide a comprehensive overview of vocal anatomy and physiology
- ✓ To examine different methodologies associated with voice pedagogy and instruction
- ✓ To enable the student with the proper tools to analyze vocal dysfunction and implement corrective behavior

INSTRUCTIONAL METHOD

MUSC 4137 uses a variety of instructional techniques. This class requires intensive lectures, class preparation, reading, and in-depth topical discussions. In addition, students will observe other voice instructors teaching applied voice as well as having hands-on applied voice experience teaching non-majors. Students are required to write about their teaching and observation experiences as well as writing a research paper. Students will learn from doing, observing, discussing, and writing.

Article Guidelines:

Typewritten format is required with use of complete sentences, accurate spelling, proper grammar and footnotes. Typical articles range between five and eight double-spaced pages (not including bibliography), but may be longer as subject matter demands. Papers should be double-spaced with standard margins, using an appropriate 12-pt. font (approx. 250 words per page) and follow the *Chicago Manual of Style* format.

Quizzes:

There will be quizzes given throughout the semester on pertinent material covered in class.

Lesson Observation:

Students are expected to observe 4 - 1/2-hour voice lessons throughout the semester.

Applied Teaching:

Students are required to teach at least 4 - 1/2-hour voice lessons to a non-major.

Vocalises:

Students are required to create vocalizes designed to correct issues and enhance technique.
