Avrin mentioned that Chancellor Dubois will be here slightly after beginning of this meeting. He will be addressing the many questions you may have for him.

- 1. **Minutes of the Previous Meeting of the Faculty Council.** No discussion ensued. Ford-Eickhoff moved to approve the minutes. Ranis seconded the motion. The minutes for the February 13, 2020 meeting were approved unanimously.
- 2. Proposed Changes to Baccalaureate Degree Progression Policy. Dupre mentions that the policy says students should not enroll in more than 7 credit hours, but nothing prevents them. Debra Joyce of the Office of the Registrar said we can set a maximum credit hours for a term, but cannot for part of terms. Departments can monitor. Dupre asked why shift from two summer terms to one summer semester with two half terms? Assistant Provost Leslie Zenk said this has to do with the new part-of-term philosophy and treating summer the same as fall and spring. Johnna Watson of the Graduate School said there is a benefit to having three semesters. For consistency, what we do for summer should be the same as fall and spring for academic support and scheduling. Avrin mentioned there is also a push by the Board of Governors for a more impactful summer. Dupre asked if there are any workload expectations for this change? Watson said Tina McEntire asked that question of the Provost, and the Provost had indicated that it is the purview of department chairs to determine what is appropriate faculty load. Jody Cebina, Director of Distance Education & Summer School, said UNC System rules have always treated the two summer sessions as one. The System may have changes for how summer is funded. The goal of half terms is to add options; the goal is to expand options. Cebina stated that nomenclature may have changed, but the schedule has not. Any schedule type in Summer 2019 can be done again in Summer 2020. With the number of questions, Avrin asked if the Faculty Council was not ready to vote. Vrikkis moved to table the agenda item. Dupre seconded the motion. The motion to table the proposed changes to the Baccalaureate Degree Progress Policy was approved.
- 3. **Proposed changes to Registration Policy.** Dupre moved to table the agenda item. Anderson seconded the motion. The motion to table the proposed changes to the Registration Policy was approved.
- 4. **Proposed New Policy on Parental Leave Accommodations for Graduate Students.** Allan moved to approve. Ogburn seconded the motion. <u>The motion to approve Parental Leave Accommodations</u> for Graduate Students Policy was approved unanimously.
- 5. **Proposed changes to Academic Load/Time Status for All Graduate Students Policy.** Whitaker mentioned that this document also mentions the summer semester. Watson said she got feedback from Associate Deans on the semester hours. Watson says we need a definition for this. In Banner

we now have one summer semester. McCarter moved to approve. Whitaker seconded the motion. The motion to approve revisions to Academic Load/Time Status for All Graduate Students Policy was approved unanimously.

- 6. **Proposed changes to Grievance Committee Size and Hearing Panel Size.** Dupre moved to approve. Brouwer seconded the motion. The motion to approve revisions to the Standing Rules of the Faculty Council and approve revisions and advance to the Board of Trustees the Procedures for Resolving Faculty Grievances was approved unanimously.
- 7. **Motion to Award Degrees Spring 2020.** Whitaker moved to approve. McCarter seconded the motion. The motion to recommend to the Chancellor the awarding of degrees was approved unanimously.
- 8. **Report of the Chancellor.** Chancellor Dubois said he did not have a report, but was happy to answer questions about the virus situation and what we are doing next. There will be extensive communications coming. Ninety students currently have gone into self-quarantine. Two cases have been reported in Mecklenburg County. Gatherings of 50 people or more will need an exception approval. Some decisions are not ours, but we have supported them...such as decisions made by Conference USA. Sports competition for spring have been suspended. No one wants to be accused of not looking out for our student athletes. Remind people the risk is low. This is a direct contact virus, not airborne. Wash hands frequently, use hand sanitizer. Our current guidance is a 3-week window (March 16-March 31). We will meet often and provide updates and extensions to this window if needed.

Mili clarified that we are not offering the courses online, but offering remotely, which is slightly different.

Q: Douglas – My daughter's class said they will still be meeting in person. Why?

A: Everybody should try to move to a non-in-person instruction, if possible. Faculty still have discretion, because labs and other types of courses, may need to be in-person.

Q: Douglas - What about international travel? Travel is already booked for this summer.

A: Wait until it becomes clear whether you must cancel. Guidance could change. If you must cancel, most airlines give you a year to use it.

Q: If students say they don't feel safe coming to class, how do we handle?

A: We are encouraging being as flexible as possible.

Q: Classes over 50 people, that need to still meet in person, are still on?

A: Yes, but you can work with Registrar's Office to use a larger room for distancing.

Q: Frevert – What about the employment side?

A: We are encouraging using remote working as much as possible. Make sure appropriate functions are staffed.

Q: If we are going to teach remotely, does the faculty have the choice to teach at home or on campus? And will we have resources?

A: Rugg - IT is planning to provide some kind of service. We are trying to figure out how to best serve your needs. CTL will be open. Phil – IT has a helpful checklist on how to work remotely. **A:** Dubois - IT has a helpful checklist on how to work remotely.

Q: Ford-Eickhoff - I appreciate your approach. My 90-year-old mother lives with me and is vulnerable. Giving everybody the opportunity to stay away from one another is helpful.

A: Different institutions have reached different choices. It is not easy. Campus shuttle will have unavailable seats, as we are not letting people sit next to each other. Looking into options at dining halls.

Q: When trying to switch to larger classrooms, how will we know which rooms are available to switch too?

A: I believe the Provost Office is compiling a list of courses that cannot meet remotely and will assist those classes.

Q: Are we looking into online testing and proctoring services?

A: Zenk – The UNC System Office is looking into this and the university will provide this information when we get this.

A: Cebina – The Feds have given some guidance on this. We cannot force students to buy something in the middle of course; costs need to be upfront. Some proctoring requires cameras. A lower-level proctoring service locks down their browser, but wouldn't lock down a second device. The most expensive version is one with a camera, because a human is involved. CTL is holding sessions on WebEx, Kaltura Quick Start, and Canvas. We are happy to assist you.

A: Sadaf - We are teaching a workshop on March 17th on using WebEx.

Dubois added that the university is looking into how to handle commencement. We are thinking though all the options. Please email my Chief of Staff Kim Bradley with any additional questions.
