The purpose of this memo is to request that the name of the Department of Global, International, and Area Studies be changed to Global Studies. The department faculty have voted unanimously in favor of the name change.

*Background:* The GIAS department was created in 2009 with the following major/minor programs:

- International Studies (B.A. and minor)
- Latin American Studies (M.A., B.A., and minor)
- Holocaust, Genocide and Human Rights (minor)
- Judaic Studies (minor)
- Islamic Studies (minor)

Given the range of different programs placed within this new department, the very, inclusive catch-all of GIAS was chosen. However, the Latin American Studies degree programs were moved back to History in 2010, and the Judaic and Islamic Studies minors have ceased to exist due to low enrollments. Only the International Studies major and minor and the HGHR minor still exist within the department.

In spring 2016, a new curriculum was introduced for the International Studies major/minor with the following areas of concentration:

- Development and Sustainability
- Holocaust, Genocide, and Human Rights, and
- Peace, Conflict, and Identity.

This moved the department away from an "area studies" focus (based on geographic regions) and toward an explicitly comparative orientation. The curriculum change brought the major/minor more in line with a global, rather than regional, focus.

Rational for the name change: The name change will better align the name of the department with the teaching and research of the department faculty. We teach *global* development, *global* human rights, and *global* peace and conflict. While we may have interests in particular regions, our faculty are not regional specialists. Global Studies will provide us with a single identity, rather than the catch-all of Global, International, and Area Studies. Also, our students' will be less confused. Their major is currently in International Studies, but their major department is GIAS. We are currently requesting to change the name of the department, but the necessary

second step will be to request a change in the major to match the new department name – a global studies major/minor within a Global Studies Department.

Why Global and not International Studies? A few decades ago, almost all of these types of interdisciplinary programs used the "international" modifier. This was at a time when the relations we studied truly were inter-nation relations because nations were, for the most part, the sole actors in global relations. Today, there are a host of different actors, in addition to nations. Individuals, non-governmental groups, multinational corporations, and international organizations now all compete for space on the global stage. For the 21st century, "global" is the appropriate modifier for interdisciplinary departments like ours.

A search within www.petersons.com reveals that there are 282 Bachelor's degree programs at U.S. colleges and universities titled either international or global studies. The vast majority are programs rather than free-standing departments.

An examination of the other universities within the UNC system reveals that 9 of 14 campuses have either global or international studies programs or departments (see Table 1). Of the nine, three use the modifier global, five use international and UNC Greensboro used both international and global. UNC Charlotte is unique in the system, being the only campus with an academic department devoted solely to global studies.

Examining Charlotte's 17 peer institutions (http://ir.uncc.edu/peer-institutions), the pattern is similar (see Table 2). Twelve universities have international or global departments or programs. Three of the twelve use the global modifier, seven use international and two (Portland State and Western Michigan) use both. Portland State is the only university among Charlotte's chosen peers to have a stand-alone department of international/global studies.
